

Annual Report 2023

October 2022 through September 2023

Land Conservation and Stewardship

- In May, 2023, HLT closed on a pristine 51-acre parcel on Mill Street near route 20 in West Hartland. The property was purchased with an In-Lieu Fee award through the Army Corps of Engineers and Audubon CT, with additional support from the Farmington River Coordinating Committee, and is now known as the Mill District Nature Sanctuary. A Mitigation Plan and the property's Conservation and Management Plan are underway. Tom Kean has volunteered to serve as Property Monitor.
- On HLT's Bassett-Kell Preserve, mitigation of invasive phragmites is ongoing, with technical support from biologist John Anderson. Kiosks with trail maps have been installed in both ends of the Preserve's red trail.
- The Beach Nature Preserve now has two great new volunteers to help with stewardship: Wade
 Banks as the property's Trail Manager has downed several hazardous dead ash trees and rerouted part of the trail to avoid our thriving milkweed colony. Jeff DeMeglio is serving as
 Property Monitor. Thanks as well to HLT volunteer Tom Dyer who pulled lots of invasive Oriental
 Bittersweet from the meadow.
- CT Agricultural Experiment Station Entomologist Carole Cheah, Ph.D., made two visits to HLT's Mill District Nature Preserve to assess damage to the Preserve's hemlock trees from the hemlock woolly adelgid and to release a small colony of predator ladybeetles obtained through a grant from the Farmington River Coordinating Committee. Work crews built a new bridge by the beaver pond and posted signage in an attempt to deter ATVs from encroaching on the property. A drone observation was conducted. Thanks to Nicki Hall and Sam Slater for their service as Property Monitors and also to all those who participated in trail maintenance.

Community Outreach and Education

- A variety of indoor as well as outdoor programs were held this year. Speaker Series events included National Park Service's Liz Lacy presenting on Wild and Scenic River Stewardship and archaeologist Lucianne Lavin, Ph.D. who spoke on Native American Winter. HLT hosted its first Birding Hike on the Mill District Nature Preserve led by Fran Zygmont; we also held a CT Trails Day Hike on the Mill District and Bassett-Kell Trails, again led by Steve and Pam Emmons. During May a group of citizen scientists assessed wildlife "pinchpoints" in both East and West Hartland for the Follow the Forest initiative promoting wildlife corridors.
- The pollinator garden at Hartland School was replanted and a rain barrel system to water the raised beds was installed. Thanks to **Amanda Lukingbeal, Tom Kean** and all the volunteers who worked on this project; the results look great.
- The Lower Farmington River and Salmon Brook Wild and Scenic Committee awarded \$2,300 to Hartland School for enhancements to the Salmon-in-Schools program. HLT volunteers assisted Middle School science teacher Deb Costolnick with proposal-writing. Deb was able to purchase some needed equipment and reported that the students gained much from having the Farmington River Watershed Association's biologist involved in this fun educational program.
- HLT also gave a presentation to the Hartland Women Creating Community, continued cooperation with the Hartland Historical Society and the Lions' Club in delivering Welcome

Packets to new Hartland residents, manned a booth at the Firemans' Carnival and marched in both the Memorial Day and Carnival parades.

Collaboration with Conservation Organizations/Conference and Workshop Participation

- 5 HLT Directors attended the CT Land Conservation Council's annual conference.
- HLT Board members monitored and submitted comments regarding MDC's Colebrook Reservoir abandonment permit application as well as State legislation banning the feeding of wildlife.

Board and Organizational Development

- HLT's Board welcomed two new members: **Tom Kean** of West Hartland and **Tom LeClerc** of East Hartland.
- HLT Board adopted a new Stewardship Policy
- Funds were transferred to an investment vehicle
